About W3C




Founded 1994 by Web inventor, Tim Berners-Lee

Mission: Lead the Web to its **Full Potential**

 Funded by membership fees, donations, grants

333 member organizations in 40 countries. Offices in 20 countries, including 3 host sites (MIT/US, ERCIM/France, Keio/Japan)

Diverse Membership



















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


Broad Reach

- Translations of standards into 45+ languages
- Liaisons w/ 40+ global standards organizations UN (IGF), ISO, ITU, IETF, OGF, Unicode, Eclipse, OMA, etc.
- 32,000 people subscribed to mailing lists
- 10,000,000 hits/day on www.w3.org
- 100+ Web standards:HTML, XML, PNG/SVG, RDF/OWL/SPARQL, accessibility, etc.
- 1,500+ participants in 60+ Groups



W3C's groups





W3C Staff

- 62 people, 49 FTE, 25 directly in WGs
- Largest cluster (about 15) at MIT
- About half work from home





So What Does W3C Do?

- Turn Possible Consensus into Standards
 - Bring together stakeholders
 - To understand each other's use cases
 - To understand the technologies

. . .

- Respecting people's contributions
- Learning to communicate effectively
- Basis in verifiable facts, running code



Decisions

- W3C groups try to make decisions by consensus
 - That is, decisions no one Formally Objects to
 - We try to minimize objections, and usually succeed
 - Every Formal Objection is reviewed by mgmt, to make sure the group really tried.
- Why would someone formally object?
 - They are convinced the decision is bad for group
 - It goes against their business. "We wont implement it".




W3C Rules and Traditions

- Rules (formal process)
 - W3C "Process Document"
 - W3C "Member Agreement"
 - Approved Charters
 - "PubRules" (for document publication)
- Traditions (informal process)
 - Meeting minutes
 - Responding to comments from the public
 - Making decision
 - Keeping people happy and productive




Working Group Life Cycle

Details: W3C Patent Policy

 Goal: Produce Specs implementable on Royalty-Free basis and allow technical work with minimal interruption

Method:

- W3C Royalty-Free licensing definition: available to all, all Essential Claims 'owned or controlled', field of use limitation, reciprocity, no fees, defensive suspension.
- W3C RF obligations for Working Group participants:
 - license Essential Claims they hold on an W3C RF basis
 - Exclusions opportunities early in the development of a specification
- Disclosure rules for non participants, based on actual knowledge
- Exception Handling: Patent Advisory Group (PAG)



In short...

- W3C has a solid track record for developing open standard Web technologies
- Work on standards involves lots of challenging issues related to the future evolution of the Web
- The process is transparent and unbiased, but participation usually requires Membership

No Silver Bullet

Good Design and Global Consensus take work.



W3C Membership

- W3C Members (Organizations)
 - Approve Activities, Recommendations
 - Nominate Participants for Wgs
 - Advisory Committee (AC Rep is Member Liaison)
 - Fees vary by size, type, country
 - 68,500 USD/yr for Large US company
 - 7,900 USD/yr for US Gov't Agency/Dept
 - 1,905 USD/yr for Non-Profit in Dev. Country
 - Usually organizations that buy or sell things which implement our standards.

Invited Experts

- Sometimes a WG needs certain other people
- Requires approval by chairs, staff contact, usually management.
- Different groups have different policies.
 - eGov Interest Group, HTML5 WG == open to all
- Sometimes provides Member access
- Not suitable for WG-related businesses
- Best to have Membership discussion first



Tools for Working Together

- Mailing Lists
- Main Website, Group Wiki
- Phone Meetings
- IRC, Bots, Scribing
- Issues
- WBS (polling)
- Document Development



Mailing Lists

- public-gld-wg@w3.org
 - Official Participants automatically on list
 - Public archives
 - Where the main written discussion takes place
- team-gld-chairs@w3.org
 - Chairs and staff contact
 - Private archives
 - Better than contacting the individuals, usually



Mailing Lists Cont'd

- public-gld-comments@w3.org
 - How everyone else talks to us
 - Also sent to all WG participants
 - We officially respond to every comment
 - If commenter is not satisfied, mgmt review
- sysreq@w3.org
 - For reporting systems problems, bugs



Main Website

- 16+ years of accumulation
- Heavy use of dates in URLs
 - http://www.w3.org/TR/
 - http://www.w3.org/TR/2009/WD-gov-data-20090908/
 - http://www.w3.org/2011/gld
- Fine-grained read/write access control
- Large portions only for W3C Members, Staff
- http://www.w3.org/Guide ("Art of Consensus")
 - Still Member-Only (alas)



Group Wiki

- GLD WG has its own Wiki
- Same software as Wikipedia
- Public can see every version of everything
- Only WG participants can write (usually)
- "Recent Changes" (rss feed)
- Try to clean up, improve things, make links
 - It's easy to undo



Phone Meetings

- We use "Zakim" bridge tied to IRC bots
- Most groups meet weekly for 60-90 minutes
- Maybe: task forces with other meetings
- CallerID can often remember who-is-who
- Use IRC commands to record who you are



IRC, Bots, Scribing

- One person, the "scribe", takes notes on IRC
- After revision and approval those become official minutes
- Others can see scribing at the same time, correct, understand
- IRC chatter ignored by some, but logged
- Polling on IRC, PROPOSED: +1/0/-1
- "Zakim" bot reports/controls phone bridge
- "RRSAgent" bot logs what's said
- Scribe.perl or CommonScribe reformat logs



Issues

- An "Issue" is a matter the group will have to resolve later. Often, a Design Decision
 - ISSUE: What color shall we paint the bike shed?
- Proposed by anyone in group
- Chairs decide if it's OPEN
- WG decision to CLOSE it
- All issues closed == Last Call
- "tracker" manages them nicely
 - It also manages Action Items



Web Based Strawpoll (WBS)

- Most of you did GLD scheduling poll
- Not as fancy as some Web polling systems
- But integrated with User Accounts
 - Poll this WG
 - Nag the people who haven't answered
- Great for groups with quiet members, fewer telecons



Document Development

- Document Storage Options
 - Editor do it themselves
 - CVS
 - Mercurial (hg)
 - Wiki
- Document Formatting Options
 - Wiki
 - ReSpec
 - Anything that makes good HTML



Welcome!
